

Securing Our Students' Future BOE Referendum Discussion

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The 2005 Referendum

- February 15, 2005 Bonds issued for \$8,244,000
- Refunding of the February 15, 2005 Debt
 - Bonds in the amount of \$5,380,000 refunded on March 28, 2013
 - Expiring February 15, 2025 (Never to come back)
- 2024/2025 Budget impact on a home value of \$429,585.
 - \$644,800 in debt payment equals an estimated payment of
 \$504 on an average household annually
 - \$42 a month





Why a New Referendum?

Facility Assessment on the Building HVAC Systems

- There are 14 classroom unit ventilators that were installed in the 1970's
 - There were multiple condensing units not functioning during the field investigation
- PAHU #4 & 6 Unable to get the air handler running after a power outages and need electrician to reboot the districts electrical system
- Multi-zone PAHU's End of useful life
- Single-zone PAHU's End of useful life
- Approximately \$25,000 in A/C units repairs in the 2023/2024 school year
 - Not including routine maintenance costs
- Engineers overall conclusion is to replace all the units
 - Cost savings to the district with the energy efficient systems

Estimated/ Projected Costs

Estimated/Projected Costs

- Total cost of construction: \$10,713,750
- Total soft costs: \$1,880,285

Total Cost \$12,564,035

- Only be able to address the LRFP with the use of a referendum to get state aid.
 - State aid of 34% for allowable costs, state portion of project costs
 \$4,271,772
 - Board share \$8,292,263
- Current debt payment per average household \$504 (Monthly \$42)
- New debt payment per average household \$484 (Monthly \$41)





Moving Forward

Going Forward Based on Current Information

- Board passes resolution in June/July to submit question to County Office for a September 17 special election.
- Between June/July and September, board provides community with communications on the proposed referendum.
- Bond question on a ballot at the September 17, 2024 Election.
- If the referendum passes, the architect will start work and will be paid using funds from the general fund until such time the referendum is funded, at which time the funds will be returned to the general fund.
- Fund 40 records the current payments of principal and interest.
- New bonds are recorded in Long-Term Debt until they expire.
